

Harvest Service Sunday 8th October.

We will again be supporting; Action For Children. Centre 56. Women and Children's Aid at two local Refuge Centres and the YMCA centre in Aintree. We would be delighted to receive food items and the following are most acceptable: Cereal and UHT milk. Bottled water. Cordial. Coffee. Tea bags. Sugar. Tinned meals eg.: curry, chilli. Tinned tuna, ham, corned beef, vegetables. Microwave meals. Pot noodles. Noodles, rice and pulses. Cooking sauces. Biscuits. Honey. Jam. Tinned fruit. Gravy granules. Salt and pepper. All the units are constantly being asked for food items and run out on a daily basis. Monetary gifts will also be collected during the service or can be sent/given to our treasurer, Andrew McLaren, before or after the service. These gifts will be converted into food vouchers and given to families who find themselves in desperate need of food day by day, by the centre key workers.

Everyone attending seemed to enjoy a happy day. Musical items from Bach to the Wallace and Gromit theme tune were played, and just about everything in between!

Funds raised to date are £645.

For those who had an attempt at the 'Name the Hymn Tune' competition -these were the answers:

- 1. 'Behold the Servant of the Lord'. Tune Mozart from Mozart's opera 'The Magic Flute' A Charles Wesley hymn no. 546 in Singing the Faith
- 2. '**Jerusalem the Golden'** Tune Ewing In older Methodist hymn books, and also Rejoice and Sing at no. 662 though with some differences in the verses
- 3. 'All things praise thee, Lord most high' Tune Te Laudant Omnia In older Methodist Hymn books, no. 331 in Hymns and Psalms
- 4. 'Love's redeeming work is done' Tune Savannah another Charles Wesley Easter hymn, from John Wesley's Foundery Collection. Not in Methodist hymn books for a while at least, or Rejoice and Sing, (although the tune can be found) but in hymn books of the Church of England
- 5. 'Sweet is the work my God, my King' Tune Deep Harmony An Isaac Watts hymn based on psalm 92 no. 90 in Singing the Faith
- 6. 'The Lord's my shepherd' .Tune Brother James's Air Psalm 23 this tune was known by quite a number of people, though not in Methodist hymn books or Rejoice and Sing

The winner was Geraldine Bounds, with strictly no 'insider' information!
